This has been difficult for the learners to adjust to working on their own for half of their school time, but we serve a way-maker God and His hand of protection and peace has been felt throughout this season.

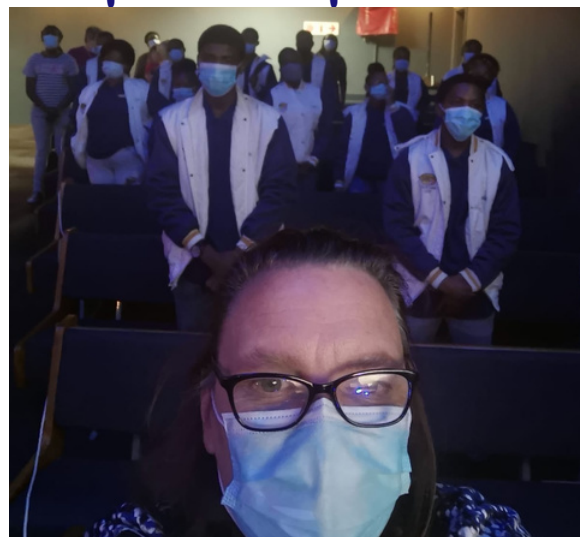
We have 11 classes altogether, serving 270 learners. We have our biggest grade 12 class since our first class in 2014, with 33 matrices set to write finals in October 2021.
